The Master of Education in School Counseling program is an intensive accelerated experience — including a year-long school-based practicum and internship — that prepares professionals to cultivate ethical, equitable, and inclusive school environments for students of diverse needs and aspirations. The program also leads to specialist-level licensure as a K-12 school counselor in some North Carolina school districts, with reciprocity options for other states. Currently, graduates of the program are eligible to apply for licensure as a Licensed Clinical Mental Health Counselor in North Carolina after two years of post-master's supervised counseling experience. Our program adopts a cohort model, utilizing applied, hands-on learning as part of a supportive, closely-knit class.



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Key components of the Master of Education in School Counseling program include:

- 14-month program of studies trains school counselors to implement comprehensive school counseling programs through their work with K-12 students and the systems through which they learn and develop.
- Employs a cohort model while following the American School Counseling Association National Model and adhering to CACREP standards.
- Strengths-based focus prepares students to address critical issues that students, parents, communities and schools face as part of K-12 learning environments.
- Practicum and internship courses require a minimum 100
 (40 direct service) hours in practicum and 600 (240 direct service) in internship in field experiences during the August-June K-12 school year.
